doing enough. Not when hundreds of animals, many of them with minor, very treatable, health issues, are being euthanized every week in our community because of lack of space and resources. We have to work even harder to save even more of these precious lives!

We know how to save lives — we know how to medically treat, provide quality temporary housing and care and successfully place dogs, cats, puppies and kittens in loving homes. And those

efforts were recognized this year when our organization was named AZ Central's Best Animal Shelter 2009. But, we have exceeded our physical capacity to increase the numbers of animals that we are able to serve and save. Yes, we could increase adoptions by expanding our foster program, find more off-site adoption venues and work even harder, but it's not going to make the kind of difference necessary to dramati-




THANKS TO YOU We are 20% over our adoption goals ... and running out of space

Around the beginning of March 2009, Maricopa County Animal Care and Control put out a plea for an organization to step up and save a Tibetan Mastiff that had been there since February 13th. His right ear was almost torn off and he

PAWS N' CLAWS KIDS CLUB

Paws N' Claws Kids Club makes a difference for animals and children! Young people often think "what can I do ... I'm iust a kid.

One of the most powerful tools we have for preventing cruelty to animals is education. It is important to plant the seeds of kindness in children early, and to nurture their development as the child grows. Children not only need to learn what they shouldn't do, but also what they can and should do.

By joining AAWL & SPCA's "Paws N' Claws Kids Club", children gaes 6-12 can make a difference for animals of all kinds. We encourage members to reach out and do something good for animals. Once a month, Kids Club members get together and work on a project or learn a new animal lesson with our education staff. Members are taught kindness, compassion and proper treatment of all living things.

FOR TEENS

Our Teen Tracks program is designed for kids ages 13-17 who love animals and might be thinking of future careers working in the animal welfare field. After passing the application and interview process, teens are put through a rigorous program of training that includes ani-

mal behavior, husbandry, handling skills and career based workshops. They are then required to work a minimum number of service hours at our Adoption Center and Education Campus.

MOBILE CLINIC

Thanks to YOU, our wonderful supporters, we were able to raise the money needed to purchase and outfit a mobile clinic which is now on the road, helping provide other animal rescue aroups with low-cost spay/ neuter surgeries. We also offer a low-

cost vaccine and microchip clinic to the public several times each month. This addition to our fleet has brought in muchneeded revenue while helping protect many animals in our community.



Happy Birthday

HAPPY BIRTHDAY came to us as a little kitten with a big problem . A compassionate community member came to our shelter holding this tiny cat begging for someone to help them. They had seen this kitten thrown out of the window of a movina car. Our medical team rushed

the kitten back to the clinic and started treating her immediately. Both of her back legs were broken and her paws had been



shredded when she tried to stop herself from tumbling down the road. We were not sure she was going to make it, but she pulled through with flying colors. We named her Happy Birthday because even though we knew she was a few months old when we got her, we were

> able to save her life and give her a new beginning, so we say her life really started the day she came to AAWL & SPCA.



NUGGET

NUGGET was a puppy we rescued from MCACC early in 2009. He had to have surgery on both eyes and had to wear a cone until his eyes healed, which took quite a while. The poor puppy grew to twice his size while wearing the cone and with stitches in both eyes. But he was a happy boy who just wanted to run around and play. Due to wearing the cone for so long, Nugget's ears stood straight up after it was removed and sometimes they even crossed! It was a happy day when Nugget found his new, loving family and, even if his ears are a

PRINGLE

PRINGLE was a cute little black dog that had a serious problem with fistulas in his mouth. He was operated on twice at AAWL & SPCA by both vets several weeks apart. However, his mouth wasn't healing and it was very painful for him. We determined his only hope was to go to a canine dental specialist, which was estimated to cost between \$1500 and \$2500. We reached out to our wonderful supporters and you came through. Within 24 hours we had the money needed to do KENDAL

KENDAL was only a month old when she came to AAWL & SPCA after being found shivering in the middle of the road on an early morning in March. It was immediately determined that she was one sick girl. Upon further testing, Kendal was diagnosed with Parvovirus. In most organizations this would be an immediate death sentence, but not at AAWL & SPCA, Kendal was admitted to the Infirmary where she was given continuous fluids and a number of different medications for approximately 10 days. Due to the amazing dedication of our medical team, Kendal recovered! She was adopted by a loving family in late April.


Our second largest event was held at Tempe Town Lake on Saturday, November 14th. America's Got Talent




Donations decreased by almost 20% in 2009 due to the economy.


