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
A Short Story by Teen Tracker, Serena Cueva

We took the challenge of filling massive burrows that the tortoises had dug. We first had to check inside the burrows for any tortoises. If we were to find tortoises in a burrow, we had the job of crawling into the hole and pulling them out. Then after our rescue mission we would fill the hole with surrounding dirt.

After three and a half hours of hard labor and accomplishing our service project, at the Phoenix Herpetological Society, we took a lunch break. We went to the pool deck to eat our pizza lunch. The pool deck is also the enclosure for the wallabies. We enjoyed our lunch with the wallabies. Some of us were nearly two feet away from the them! After lunch with wallabies we saw a wide variety of reptiles. The most common animals we saw were red-eared sliders (turtles) and tortoises. We saw snakes that ranged from red-tail boas to every breed of rattlesnake and then to cobras. It's a plus to being a Teen Tracker!
